#### A Meditation for the New Year

From the Wilshire Boulevard Temple High Holy Days Prayerbook

## **High Holy Days Security Procedures**

Dear friends,

This year, we will enhance our security procedures, as has been recommended by the Secure Community Network (SCN), the official safety and security organization for the Jewish Community in North America. Their services are made available to us through the Jewish Federation of Western Connecticut.

As we all know, there has been a significant rise in antisemitism in the United States and worldwide, and so we will be implementing greater security measures here at Temple Sholom.

Our overall goals are to be welcoming and to be secure. Our challenge is to make sure we do not compromise on either value. We will be following an entry procedure recommended by SCN. It's important for everyone to know and understand the process before the High Holy Days arrive. Entry will likely take a little longer than usual, so please have patience, and try to arrive at least fifteen to thirty minutes before services are scheduled to start.

You will be welcomed by someone for check-in, a Temple Sholom greeter, and a New Milford police officer who will all be ready to assist with smiles for your presence! Remember that to be on the Temple Sholom membership list you must have renewed your membership for 2025-2026. Visitors must have pre-arranged attendance with a suggested donation of \$180/person for the HHD Services. No one will be turned away for financial reasons but entry will not be permitted without membership or pre-registration.

When you arrive at the reception table, you may be asked for photo ID. Some of the receptionists and greeters may be relatively new to Temple Sholom and may not recognize everyone. If our greeter does not recognize you, please try not to be offended and remember we are simply trying to keep our facility safe.

We are working to be welcoming and secure. Our processes will be new and could take time to both get used to and to accommodate everyone. We apologize in advance if this causes any inconvenience, but we want to keep you as safe as possible. This is simply the world we live in today and what matters the most is how we will treat one another in our relationships and consider what kind of community we can build together.

## **Welcoming Members and Guests**

We welcome our temple members to join us for the High Holy Days Services! If you are traveling during the High Holy Days and wish to attend services at another synagogue, our temple office is happy to provide a membership letter so you may receive reciprocal privileges. For non-members, entry to High Holy Days services requires pre-registration. We recommend a donation of \$180 per person and will gladly accept a gift at any level.

NOTE: This year, we will enter the Temple through the back parking lot door. The front door will be closed, locked, and unstaffed.

## Performing Acts of Tzedakah - Deeds of Loving-Kindness

During the High Holy Days, the machzor (prayerbook) reminds us: "teshuvah, tefillah, and tzedakah (repentance, prayer, and charity) help avert the evil decree." We can improve both our own lot and that of our neighbor by seeking forgiveness, offering sincere prayer, and performing deeds of loving-kindness, justice, and good-will.

While teshuvah relies very much upon the individual and our services will provide a platform for your tefillah, communally we can share in tzedakah. During the ten Days of Repentance, from Rosh HaShanah to Yom Kippur, please bring non-perishable items to the temple OR drop off a check made out to: New Milford Food Bank. Bags and checks will be delivered after Yom Kippur.
